CSQ 2003 has come and gone and I am once again left with wonderful memories of the event!

The weekend started out cold and rainy, but we didn't let that stop us as the staff began arriving on Thursday to set up for the event. Friday began cloudy and cold as well but warmed some during the afternoon and got quite cool again after sunset. Saturday was a bit warmer and we saw the sun for part of the day. Sunday started cool again, but by the time the event concluded the sun was out and it was quite warm! Just in time to pack up and go home!

Our attendance was down this year. Including people who came for just one day we had 73 people on-site, down from the 105 we had last year. I attribute the de-

crease to the Iraq conflict and the bad economy making it difficult for people to attend.

As usual, Camp Millstone was in good condition when we arrived. In the past Gene brought in an IMPACT work crew to help clean up the camp before our arrival, but IMPACT is no longer operating in his area so his own crew had to work extra hard to get the camp ready for us.

# Surfing Your Surveys, CSQ 2003

Spring Quest 2003 received high marks from those participants completing the event questionnaire (about 18% of participants). On our rating scale of 1 (worst) to 5 (best), the event received an overall rating of 4.8! However, when evaluating what was best about the weekend, there wasn't a clear winner - many things were cited as the best: rituals, the sense of community, the food, the intimate feeling of the weekend, living in sacred space.

There was a clear winner for what was the worst part of the weekend - 50% of respondents named the cold, rainy weather! One participant put it beautifully by stating that the worst part of the weekend was stepping out of the warm shower into 40-degree air - BRRR!!!!

The massage intensive was ranked GREAT by the 50% of its attendees that responded in the survey. One-hundred percent of the respondents attended both the Opening and Closing Rituals, 92% were at the Main Ritual, 31% attended the Key-note (with a 3.8 rating), and 15% participated in our first-ever Rainbow Bridge Ritual. A surprising 77% attended the business meeting - and I've received several comments about folks liking the agenda items being broken up over several shorter sessions rather than a marathon meeting on Sunday. Subjects requested for next year include repeats on lantern-making, pyromancy, and incense making. New subjects suggested were chants & songs for ritual, ritual construction, mask-making (LuAnn was sorely missed), robe-making, henna body-painting, candlemaking, basketweaving, and a single session massage lesson. Please note, if one of these calls to your area of expertise, let me know so we can get you on the schedule for 2004.

In evaluating Facilities and Operations, Bill, Torrin, and Tyana's kitchen service blew the scale by receiving a 5.2 out of 5.0 rating and 100% of those stating special dietary needs had them met. Several folks commented on how much they appreciate the kitchen staff's sensitivity to and creativity with vegetarian/vegan diets. To those of you that responded that the one thing to keep for 2004 is the same kitchen staff, my sincere apologies - Bill, Torrin, and Tyana have firmly stated that they are taking some time off from the kitchen - and they well deserve a rest after the past three years of service. 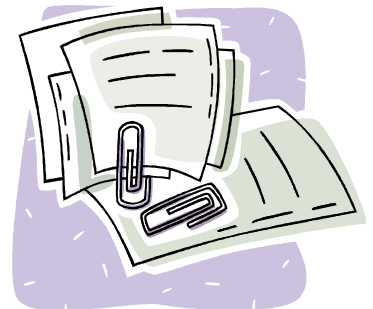
## CSQ 2003 Ritual Epilog

hope to find an able team that can continue in their footsteps.

Camp Millstone received an overall rating of 4.5 with the baths rating 3.8 (generous, considering one of them was unusable) to getting around the camp at 4.8. The cabins received a rating of 4.1 despite their lack of heat and the heavy pollen factor. The Dining Hall ranked at 4.5, the Rec Hall at 4.4, and getting to the camp itself received a 4.5. Suggestions for improvement included better signage and directions, that we acknowledge the dedication of the event staff by waiving their clean-up deposits (made by non-staff members, thank you), keep the snack table and kid-friendly food line, and that we respect our sacred fire rings by not throwing cigarette butts or other trash into the fire.



Registration and Communications feedback gave the event schedule a 4.7, followed by the catalog at 4.6.

The registration fee and website tied at 4.5, with the registration process receiving a 4.0 rating. Suggestions in this area included de-emphasizing the phrase "work" from our sacred activities by changing "workshops" to "Learning Circles" and "workshifts" to "Community Service". The on-site registration process continues to be an area for refinement, as it is the transition point between the mundane world and our sacred space. One participant suggested a smudging station at the entrance to registration so that we would consciously enter the weekend beginning with check-in.

Thanks to all of you that returned your questionnaire, your comments will help in planning 2004 and beyond. Those of you that have a questionnaire still in hand or other suggestions and comments for consideration, please forward them to the CSQ mailing address (PO Box 61335, Durham, NC 27715) so that we can continue to shape the event around our Community Vision.

**Kathy Sage** worked with **Tara** in the **East**. Hear the **Wisdom**: "I am Tara, Tibetan star goddess, fully awakened Buddha. I emerged from the tears of the great bodhisattva, Avilokiteshvara, as he wept for the suffering of humanity. From his tears, a deep pond formed; from its depths, a blue lotus flower appeared, and on it I stood, radiant princess. I am the quintessence of Compassion itself. I am She Who Ferries You Across the Ocean of Existence toward Enlightenment, safely. I am your Refuge from all fear. More

swiftly than you can speak my name, I protect you from mundane, physical danger, and those of a spiritual form. In my green form, I am a forest goddess. My emanation in white evokes the moon. Are there those among you that ache for courage and strength? I come as the All-Mother that Dreamed the World and I sing my children along their path. Are there those among you that have had their skin grow too tight, come, grow, shed your old skin and be transformed. Come to Corroboree. Follow your songline. Come to me and be transformed."

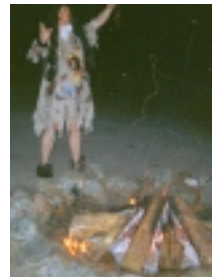

### Vision

In pondering the level and area of involvement, consider the vision behind the theme.

Co-director, Tamia Buckingham, provided the following vision behind the 2004 theme: “The description of a spiritual discipline or denomination as a path is a common metaphor. Native American traditions declare that “All Roads are Good.” The Major Arcana of the Tarot is classified as the

Journey of the Fool. The Christians place a dualistic spin on the concept – deeming the pathway to Hell as paved with good intentions, while the streets of Heaven are paved in gold. The Norse and Greco-Roman epic poems epitomized the hero’s journey in Beowulf and the Odyssey. The traditions that grew out of the African Diaspora not only talk about the path, but place specific emphasis on the crossroads where paths meet and diverge.

From the Buddhist’s middle path to Enlightenment to the Aboriginal songlines that provide the pathway through the Dreamtime and during walkabout, the journey receives as much or more emphasis than the destination. This is never more evident than in the practice of walking a labyrinth – which leads the walker gradually into the center, which serves as a brief resting spot before journeying outwards.

Spring Quest is, in itself, a labyrinth – we journey along our separate paths throughout the year, coming together in the center at Millstone to celebrate community and pause for the weekend. At the end of the Gathering, we spiral out on our individual paths yet again, renewed and refreshed by our time together.

As we spiral out from Stepping Into the Light at Spring Quest 2003, I invite you to ponder the words of Rev. Scotty McLennan, “The path is the goal.” And when we return to the center of the Spring Quest labyrinth, we will share our paths, celebrate our diversity, and rejoice in our community. So whether your practice is Eclectic or Traditional, Asatru or Wiccan, Druidic or Vedic, Ancestral or Techno, come prepared to share your path and the paths of others through learning circles, rituals, and fireside chats. As well, bring a flask of water from your journey, when we come together in the center, we will symbolize the joining of our community by filling our cauldron from our individual wells.”

recommend it to friends. From a facilities and operations standpoint, the site, including the lodge, received high marks. Meals were deemed very good – with the real complaint being that folks ate too much.

Communications received compliments on the catalog and the easy registration process. Several new faces to CSQ events were in evidence and it was good to get to know one another in a relaxed atmosphere. Two of those new folks – Brenda and Diane – were kind enough to write about their CSQ experience in our Winter newsletter.

From a programs standpoint, we needed more delineated workshop space – particularly for quiet topics. The opening ritual was a real community builder – encompassing the introduction of each participant in the casting of the circle and the building of the community altar. The piloting of a salon rather than a more structured main ritual left people hungry for deep ritual work, and an outside bonfire and drumming time would be great additions. Adding a hot tub was also requested – though we'll have to explore the logistics on that front!

The workshop topics were on target – with requests for another basket-making session (warning: basket-weaving is a highly habit forming activity!), more kitchen-based learning circles, numerology, runes, songs & chants, meditation circles, and a guided search for fairy stones. The hike was definitely an activity to keep on the schedule as well – though folks said that the natural beauty was too overwhelming to view in total silence.

At the end of the weekend, the overwhelming feeling was to hold Winter Quest again. So stay tuned for details as this addition to the CSQ event line up continues to take shape.

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## Carolina Spirit Quest College Scholarship

Carolina Spirit Quest is pleased to announce the 2003 Pagan College Scholarship Application.

The Scholarship will award one student a \$500 stipend for the 2003-2004 academic year. Applicants must be enrolled or planning to enroll in a full-time course of study at any accredited two- or four-year college, university or vocational-technical school.

Applying students will need to complete the application forms, including two short essay questions, and provide letters of recommendation. Application forms are available as downloadable forms on the Carolina Spirit Quest website

All applications must be post-marked on or before June 15, 2003 for consideration by the College Scholarship Committee. The scholarship recipient will be notified by July 30, 2003.
