## A New Quest Event

Join Carolina Spirit Quest at a new weekend event this January – Winter Quest! So many of us have jobs that don't allow us to listen to the cycle of the natural world – particularly in the winter when Nature's message is one of rest and renewal. **Workshops** — There are four workshop periods with two or three offerings in each period. Descriptions of the workshops appear elsewhere. Note that the massage workshop takes all four periods. It is not suitable to drop in and out of this class. Similarly, the basket making workshop extends over two periods.

It is expected that several participants will choose to **drum, dance or converse** during the Friday evening workshop period. Others may wish to pursue unscheduled activities during some of the other periods.

**Worship**— our Opening Ritual will include the construction of our Community Altar. The Main Ritual highlights the sharing of our talents – along the lines of a salon. The Closing Ritual focuses on what we each carry away from our journey.

**Housing** – the Fairy Stone Lodge and Cabins are heated and air-conditioned. Linens are provided. Full kitchens and bath facilities are incorporated in the lodge and each cabin. The lodge is handicapped accessible.

## Fairy Stone State Park Stuart, Virginia

**General Information:** Fairy Stone State Park is home of the mysterious "fairy stones." It is one of the six original Virginia state parks to open on June 15, 1936. The treasured stone so prevalent in the region, beautiful scenery, rich history and ample recreational opportunities make Fairy Stone one of the favorites of park visitors. Junius B. Fishburn, who had been president of the Southwest Virginia Trust Company, donated the 4,868-acre site, making it the largest of the six original parks and one of the largest to this day.

### *The Legend of the Fairy Stone*

Many hundreds of years before Chief Powhatan's reign, fairies were dancing around a spring of water, playing with naiads and wood nymphs, when an elfin messenger arrived from a city far away. He brought news of the death of Christ. When these creatures of the forest heard the story of the crucifixion, they wept. As their tears fell upon the earth, they crystallized to form beautiful crosses. When the fairies disappeared from the enchanted place, ground about the spring and the adjacent valley was strewn with these mementos of the event.

For many years people held these little crosses in superstitious awe, firm in the belief that they protected the wearer against

witchcraft, sickness, accidents and disaster. Fairy stones are brown staurolite, a combination of silica, iron and aluminum. Together, these minerals crystallize in twin form, accounting for the crosslike structure. Found only in rocks that have been subjected to great heat and pressure, the stones are most commonly shaped like St. Andrew's and Roman crosses. The most sought after are those in the shape of the Maltese cross. The rare staurolite stones are found elsewhere but not in such abundance and shaped so nearly like crosses as in the vicinity of Fairy Stone State Park.

**Location:** From I-81 near Roanoke, take exit to Route 581 to Route 220 South to Route 57 West to Route 346 North (Fairystone Lake Drive). From I-77 near Hillsville, take Route 58 East to Route 8 North to Route 57 East to Route 346 North (Fairystone Lake Drive). From Greensboro, take Route 220 North to Route 220 North bypass at Martinsville, then Route 57 West to Route 346 North. From Richmond, take Route 360 West to Route 58 West to Route 220 North Bypass at Martinsville to Route 57 West to Route 346 North.

# Registration Information

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Registration fee is \$75.00 per person.

Each person is required to make a \$5 cleanup deposit. This deposit will be returned when we have cleaned up the lodge and cabins and we are ready for the Rangers checkup inspection.

Late registration fee of \$20 is due on all registrations post-marked after December 20, 2002.

Refund of registration fee, less \$10 for handling, will be made if cancellation is in the hands of the registrar by January 14, 2003 at midnight.

Registration is limited to 32 people. Register early. Registrations are processed in the order that complete registrations are

received. If necessary, a waiting list will be maintained. Persons on the waiting list will be notified of any cancellations by January 15.

**The event will not be cancelled due to weather unless the Commonwealth of Virginia closes the highways in the park area.** The park does not close due to bad weather.

# Workshop Descriptions



## **Basket Making as a Moving Meditation — Tamia**

Basket making is one of the oldest craft forms and is one of the few that has not been mechanized. Most indigenous cultures have a basketry tradition - some with complex methods that have been lost from the current knowledge base. This workshop will provide an overview of basketry techniques and history. We will focus on the individual construction of ribbed baskets, a form that is ideally suited to meditation and completion within the span of a weekend. Materials, sufficient for each person to complete a medium-sized basket, will be provided. Handouts for continuing with other basket techniques will be available.

This is a five hour workshop meeting both Friday evening and Saturday morning.



## **Kitchen Witchery – Bread-making and Herbal Foods — Tamia**

This workshop will manifest in the main meal on Saturday evening – a feast for the five senses. In addition to preparation of the dinner – which will involve lots of magick of itself, we will blend herbal teas, bake bread, and make jellies. Come away from this workshop with knowledge of herbal culinary magick and some special herbal treats to carry home. Recipes from the entire meal, as well as other herbal recipes used over the weekend, will be provided as a handout.

## **Massage: The Gift of Pleasure — Dick Merritt**

Being able to touch skillfully and sensitively enhances our sensual expression. To touch with awareness is a beautiful gift for a friend or lover. Massage and the healing power of touch underlie most bodywork and healing energy modalities. It can be a part of many diverse spiritual paths. Besides, it is fun.

Workshop consists of demonstrations and practice. Participants will learn to and will give a full body massage. We will introduce polarity therapy, perhaps the easiest of the many tech-

niques for using healing energy. Open to couples and individuals. Wear brief clothing or bathing suit (**two-piece** for women). Bring sheet, towel and sleeping bag or heavy blanket for **each** participant. Bring a massage table if you have one. Oil is furnished.

This is a ten hour workshop, requiring all four workshop periods.



## **Journaling: Writing for insight and spiritual growth — Sharon Hill**

Journaling is a way of communicating with one's inner self. In this workshop we will both discuss journaling and complete exercises to support our self-knowledge and to move us beyond past wounds and issues.

This workshop meets Saturday morning.



## **Creating and Using Prayer/Meditation Beads — Tammie Ward**

I use prayer/meditation beads to help me meditate. Sitting and being quiet is almost impossible for me. Prayer/meditation beads work for me. They help me remember what is important in my life and to let go of the bull. I am always excited to find a new bead to add to my collection.

This workshop is offered Saturday afternoon.



## **Hiking in the Winter Landscape — Tammie Ward**

Fairy Stone has many trails to hike. One of the ways to listen to the rhythms of nature is to take a leisurely hike through the winter landscape. It can be a veritable walking meditation in silence. Join Tammie and enjoy the Zen of the winter world.



He has been leading rituals for groups of up to 300 participants and studying those led by others since the late 80's. A techno-pagan, he is a UNIX technician.
